Dear friends,

He is Risen, He is Risen, indeed! As you have heard me say before, Easter is an entire liturgical season. Yes, it's a specific holiday, but it's also a 50 day period between that blessed Sunday and the day of Pentecost. This is a time where we focus in special ways on the hope and possibilities that come with the Resurrection of Christ. We follow the resurrected Jesus in the days before his ascension to heaven and revisit pre-crucifixion scripture passages with renewed understanding of his message from this side of the cross and tomb.

On behalf of the entire church, I extend deepest appreciation to everyone who helped with our Lent, Holy Week, and Easter observances this year. So many willing helpers, so many generous stewards of God's gifts, so many courageous evangelists inviting family, friends, and neighbors to praise God with us! Thank you one and all for the ways you glorify God with your life and discipleship.

On the other side of the 50 days of Easter is the day of Pentecost, sometimes tongue in cheek referred to as "the birthday of the Church." Indeed, with tongues of fire and voices from every nation the Holy Spirit did call forth the Church from Jesus' followers. From there the Christian faith spread heart by heart, life by life, as faithful witnesses shared the Good News of Jesus Christ. Following Pentecost, we will turn

our hearts and attention to the Church itself, our identity, mission, and calling: from that first day all the way up to today.

We will hold our final Wednesday Bible Study series of this season during the month of May. After May 25 we will rest for the summer before resuming in the fall. This final four week series is titled "The End," appropriately so as it will focus on how each of the four Gospels concludes its story of Jesus. How a person ends their story tells us a lot about their message as a whole and where we, the readers and hearers, are being invited to go next. Check your Weekly Email and bulletins for each week's focus passage.

Our hiring team is continuing to prayerfully seek the right match for our Director of Next Generation Ministries position. They have interviewed multiple candidates. One of those candidates came for an in person second round interview weekend and ultimately accepted a position elsewhere to stay geographically close to family. Sometimes the Holy Spirit leads us on a winding path of discernment. I feel that we are getting close and I am certain that this process will lead us to God's intended match for our church community.

I have four (yes four!) book recommendations in this issue. Perhaps one, some, or all of these will interest you!

Clouded Sky by Miklós Radnóti

Radnóti was a Hungarian Jewish poet born in 1909. Radnóti's writings encompass his lived experience leading up to and during World War II. The website PoetryFoundation.org describes Radnóti as "one of the most important poetic witnesses to the Holocaust." The final poems in this book, and the final writings of his life, were discovered posthumously in a notebook carried on his person.

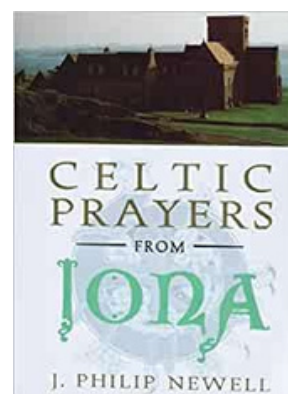


Israel: A Simple Guide To The Most Misunderstood Country On Earth by Noa Tishby

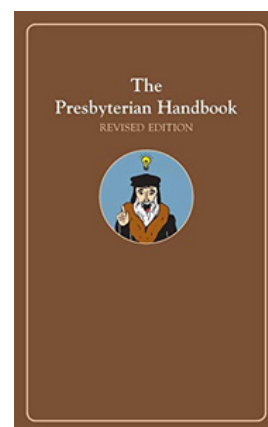


Celtic Prayers from Iona by J. Philip Newell
Here's another engaging and meaningful daily prayer resource, this time from the Christian community on the island of Iona. This island to the west of Scotland is described as "the cradle of Christianity for much of Scotland and northern England." It has long been considered a holy place for pilgrimage, study, and intentional Christian living. Newell, the former Warden of the Iona Abbey, compiled this book of prayer and daily worship using materials from the community.

My friends,

It is with great joy that I share some news with you: we have added two more singers to our choir! Jihanna Davis and Charles Parris, both of whom sang for our Holy week services, have joined our ranks to sing Alto and Bass respectively. After one of the services during Holy week, one congregation member asked, "Could we have music like this every week?" which I think is a testament to the power of music and numerous voices in the choir! If you would like to join our choir, please let me know. We have an email list where we communicate rehearsal dates and times.

For quite a while now, I have been speaking with our Worship Team about adding a Contemporary Praise/Gospel service periodically and I am thrilled to say that our first will be June 12! We will have a small band and a filled out choir singing some moving songs. Mark your calendars and invite the family and friends; it's going to be an unforgettable morning that will mark the beginning of a new tradition at Geneva!

As in the past, our summer schedule begins June 26. This means that our choir will break for the summer, but we will have cantors, meaning solo singers, lead the music for each service. We will also have substitute pianists and organists to provide beautiful music all summer long. Please join us for our final service with full choir and handbells on June 19.

Over the last year, I have been on the planning committee for the Massanetta Springs Church Music Conference, which happens annually during the last week of July. While I have only attended the conference twice, it's something I look forward to each summer. During the same week, there is a Bible Conference and daily services where different selected pastors, from all around the country, lead the worship service. This year will be the centennial celebration of the camps and in honor of that, the pastor presiding over both conferences will be Scottish hymn-writer and minister Rev. John L. Bell. If you're not familiar with the name, you may be aware of one of the songs he has written: The Summons. "Will you come and follow me if I but call Your name?" is the first line. We have sung it many times at Geneva and I can honestly say it is one of my favorite hymns. Rev. Bell has traveled all over

the world preaching and lecturing in theological colleges where he focuses on the renewal of congregational worship at the grass roots level. In 2017, after the shock of Lizzie Lowe taking her own life for fear the church would not accept that she was gay, Bell came out as a gay man. He has since worked on acceptance within the church of the LGBTQ+ communities. Several collections of his work have been translated into Swedish, Norwegian, Finnish, Danish, Dutch, Japanese, Frisian, and German. If you are interested in attending either the music conference or the bible study conference, please let me know and I can give you more detailed information. You can also visit <https://massanettasprings.org/all-programs> for more detailed information about either. And just so you know, you don't need to be a music director for the music conference! Many of the attendees are folks in their church choirs, handbell and singing, who love making music!

On a more personal note, many of you know that I have been on quite a health journey. I am working closely with physical therapists, numerous doctors, and (off and on) a personal trainer, all of whom are in contact with each other to figure out what has been going on in my body since June 2021 - or even earlier. I have lost a little over 40 lbs since I began working toward a healthier lifestyle. I am so grateful for those who reach out and those that keep me in their prayers. I'm so thankful for the people God has brought into my life, those that love, support, and help keep me mentally, spiritually, and physiologically well.

Let us continue our journey of discovery of the faceted-glass windows that surround Geneva's Sanctuary. These windows have been in the Sanctuary since the first worship service on December 28, 1969. Each window has a name and tells a story. In my March 2022 Radiant article, we discovered the meaning of the three faceted-glass windows along the far wall by the Sound Booth. This Radiant article will focus on the four faceted-glass windows that line the back wall of the Sanctuary. As you enter the Sanctuary, the first window you pass is "The Sword of the Living Word Window." The next window is "The John Calvin Window." The third window is "The John Knox Window." The last window by the Sound Booth is "The Celtic Cross Window." The stories of these windows are based on an article that Rev Anne Benefield wrote in 2003.

"The Sword of the Living Word Window" features a sword at the top of the window and an open Bible at the center. St. Paul interprets this symbolism in Ephesian chapter 6 verse 17: "Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." In Hebrews chapter 4 verse 12, St. Paul says of both the Law and Gospel "The word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing the division of soul and spirit, of joints and marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." This window was dedicated to the Glory of God and in memory of Evariste Franchere.

"The John Calvin Window" at the very top of the window features a hand holding a burning heart, which was the center of John Calvin's seal. Around the hand holding the burning heart are the words "My heart I give thee eagerly and sincerely." This too was on John Calvin's seal. A little background on John Calvin. He was born July 10, 1509. He was French by birth but

carried out most of his ministry in Geneva, Switzerland (the namesake of our church). John Calvin is known as the father of the Presbyterian and Reformed faith. He emphasized theology, worship, education, thrift, ethical behavior, and representative government. He believed that everything we do we should do to the Glory of God whether it be work, play, or thoughts. This window was dedicated to the Glory of God and in memory of Paul E. Prosswimmer, Sr.

"The John Knox Window" features a scroll beneath a Bible. It is said that the imagery is pure reformed theology and speaks to the belief that all riches of faith should be available to all believers. Before the Reformation only a few people could read, even fewer people could read Latin which was the language the Bible had been translated into. As Presbyterians, we are indebted to John Knox not only for our church form of government, but for our country's form of government. The United States government is organized along the lines of the Scottish First Book of Discipline written by John Knox. This document attempted to apply the system John Calvin worked out in Geneva, Switzerland to the whole kingdom. John Knox took the secular and gave it shape and form by adding in the sacred. This window was dedicated to the Glory of God and in memory of William A. Strain.

"The Celtic Cross Window" features two symbols, the cross and the circle. The cross represents Christ and His sacrifice. The horizontal arms represent the physical world and the vertical arms represent the spiritual world. When they meet in the center, a balance is achieved creating a sense of wholeness. The circle is the symbol of eternity that emphasizes the endless love of God as shown in Christ. There is legend that when St. Patrick (no, not our dear Pastor Patrick) was preaching to some soon-to-be-converted

heathens, they showed him a stone that was marked with a circle symbolic of the moon goddess. St. Patrick made the mark of the Latin cross through the circle and blessed the stone. Thereby, making the first Celtic Cross. This window was dedicated to the Glory of God and in memory of Mildred A. Andreen.

The next time you are in the Sanctuary, look at these four beautiful faceted-glass windows. Look for the symbolism and know their beauty conveys some of the basic tenants of our faith.

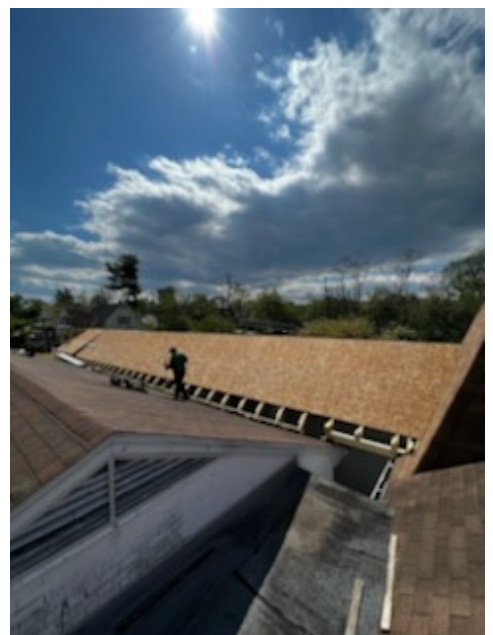
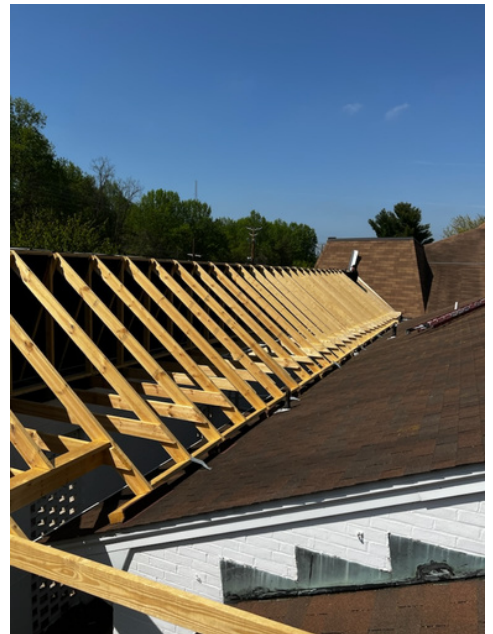

Renovation underway!

Replacement of the facade in front of the church house began on April 11. The project bid process was overseen by Elaine and Rolf Winch, approved by Executive, and awarded to Jara Construction. To minimize disruption and maintain low visibility a process of building beside the existing structure was implemented. All of the old facade is being removed and replaced with new construction materials. Additional structural “rafter” members will make for a stronger structure than previously in place. Almost complete covering of the interior sidewalk is another of the enhancements. The complete enclosure was not undertaken to avoid considerable additional expense for water management between the roofs and more complex work to the house. The benefit was decided to not be worth the expense. One visual result will be an imperfect (but very close) match of shingle color between the new and existing roofs. The project will likely be complete in the next few weeks.

As we head into the summer months, Session has approved the first 3 months of financial statements. And, so far we are slightly ahead of budget – more income than expected, and lower expenses than projected. It's still early in the process, so no real trend can be forecast, but we are doing well so far.

This will be an interesting and slightly different year from a financial perspective. As reported in prior Radiant articles, Geneva has approved a switch from a calendar year (January 1 to December 31), to a fiscal year (September 1 to August 31). That means we will have a “short” year that goes from January 1, 2022, to August 31, 2022. And September 1, 2022 starts our new fiscal year.

So how does that affect us? Well, the Executive Committee will ask current serving Elders to submit their budget requests in late summer. Then we will work on developing a new budget, which will be presented in an Annual Congregational meeting. That meeting will be earlier than prior meetings (which were typically in February or early March).

Please note that changing to a fiscal year will not affect pledging or donation statements – those will still reflect what has been contributed during the year, for tax reporting purposes. Bottom line: this year's financial statements will reflect only 8 months – then we start a new budget and fiscal year in September.

Clear as mud, right !?!

If you have any questions about this, please feel free to ask me – I really enjoy talking about (and explaining) this stuff. I guess that's why I'm your treasurer. :-)
